
World famous rock star delivers York College music lesson!

Kelly Hansen, the lead singer of the iconic rock band Foreigner, recently provided a music lesson to York College students through a live link from Los Angeles. This event took place just days after his final performance with the band, which is renowned for hits like "I Want to Know What Love Is." During the hour-long session, organized by A Level Music tutor Cat Wright, Hansen discussed his early passion for music, recalling his ability to memorize over 400 songs as a child.

Students engaged with him in a question-and-answer format, during which he offered insights into performing on stage, including advice on achieving a balance between being a technically proficient singer and an engaging performer. Hansen shared personal tips, such as his unique vocal warm-up routine and dietary choices to maintain vocal health, like avoiding spicy food before performances to prevent acid reflux.

He reflected on memorable moments from his career, such as the unique experience of hearing a crowd of 9,000 in Bulgaria sing "I Want to Know What Love Is" back to him. Hansen emphasised the joy of performing in Europe during spring and discussed the challenge of choosing a favorite venue among the many prestigious locations he has played, including the Sydney Opera House and Carnegie Hall. When queried about ideal collaborations with music legends, he expressed admiration for Aretha Franklin and Ray Charles.

Apprentices build a professional portfolio and complete a final End-Point Assessment (EPA) to demonstrate their competence.





CATCH Recognised Nationally for Leading the way in Clean Energy Skills

CATCH has been recognised in the UK Government's Clean Energy Jobs Plan as a leading example of how industry and education can work together to create the skilled workforce needed for the clean energy future.

Based in Scunthorpe, CATCH already operates as the new "Technical Excellence College" model, training people for real industrial careers. The triple-award winning organisation delivers apprenticeships and training in 11 of the identified priority occupations, students are supported by tutors who bring years of experience from working in industry. Its facilities are designed to feel like real industrial workplaces, giving learners hands-on experience that prepares them for their future careers. The organisation also leads the way in inclusion, running Women in Engineering initiatives, Equality Diversity, Inclusivity and Belonging network, and a dedicated outreach team connecting schools and communities with opportunities in the industrial sectors.

David Talbot, CATCH CEO, said, "Our strength lies in our deep rooted industrial connections, with investors, local councils, government, and employers across the region. Our offer spans the full talent pipeline, from pre-apprenticeships and Skills Bootcamps through to Level 4 HNC programmes which will be delivered from September 2026, ensuring opportunities for learners at every stage. It also supports the existing and transitioning workforce through short courses for upskilling and reskilling, aligned with the region's industrial needs including, Local Skills Improvement Plans and working with the Office for Clean Energy Jobs Training Guarantee, and the national clean energy skills pilot".

The Government's report describes CATCH as "an employer-led training provider, co-funded by industry and government, supporting reskilling in hydrogen, carbon capture, utilisation and storage, and process operation."





Engineering The Future

HETA Secures Skills Bootcamp Funding to Help Employers Upskill Their Workforce

HETA has secured funding from the Government's Skills Bootcamp programme to assist employers in Hull and the East Riding in enhancing their workforce's skills in key engineering fields.

The initiative includes four fully funded training programmes: Electrical Engineering, Mechanical Engineering, Multi-skilled Engineering, and Fabrication and Welding.

Local employers can enhance their teams' technical capabilities while addressing skills gaps and improving productivity, contributing only 10% to 30% of total training costs based on business size, with the remainder funded by the Government.

The funding must be utilized by March 2026, and registration is limited, emphasising the need for early sign-up. Iain Elliott, Chief Executive of HETA, highlighted the importance of skilled workers in maintaining competitiveness in the engineering and manufacturing sectors.

The courses will be short and modular, designed according to employer feedback, allowing businesses to focus on specific skills relevant to their operations with minimal disruption.

Hair & Beauty students from Castleford College and Selby College participated in a specialised training program in Tokyo, Japan, aimed at deepening their understanding of East Asia's beauty industry.

Over two weeks, students engaged in hands-on training at notable Japanese salons such as Panasonic Beauty Salon and Hair Taya Salon, learning skills in hair care, coloring, counseling, and Japanese-style makeup techniques. The experience not only allowed them to enhance their existing skills but also included cultural immersion through visits to iconic sites like Shibuya Sky Tower and the teamLab art museum.

Richard Burgess, Deputy Head of Curriculum for Hair & Beauty, expressed that the trip was a memorable opportunity for students to gain insights into professional standards in the beauty industry, enhancing their employability. Students reported feeling inspired by the professionalism they observed from Japanese salon staff, which aligned with their aspirations, including starting their own salons.

The colleges, part of the Heart of Yorkshire Education Group, also operate student-run salons open to the public, enabling practical experience with real clients. Applications for the Hair & Beauty programs at these colleges for the 2026/2027 academic year are now open.

Kirklees College hosts Safeguarding & Pastoral Support Conference 2025

On November 14, 2025, Kirklees College hosted the Safeguarding & Pastoral Support Conference, bringing together delegates from various educational and public sectors, including partners like Our Future Kirklees and Huddersfield New College. The conference aimed to address crucial issues impacting young people in the area, reflecting the college's commitment to a restorative, trauma-informed, and anti-racist educational environment.

The event featured keynote speeches from Lisa Eaton, Director of Safeguarding, and Principal Palvinder Singh, alongside insights from DCI Oliver Coates of West Yorkshire Police and Polly Harrow, DfE FE Student Support Champion. The agenda included workshops focused on Exploitation, Misogyny & Sexual Harassment, and Prevent, encouraging student participation with a speech from the Students' Union President.
